She has edited Requirements for Certification since the 2000-01 edition. *HIV/AIDS and the Social Consequences of Untamed Biomedicine* May 26 2020 Drawing on the case of HIV/AIDS in Thailand, this book examines how anthropological and other interpretative social science research has been utilized in modeling the AIDS epidemic, and in the design and implementation of interventions. It argues that much

social science research has been complicit with the forces that generated the epidemic and with the social control agendas of the state, and that as such it has increased the weight of structural violence bearing upon the afflicted. The book also questions claims of Thai AIDS control success, arguing that these can only be made at the cost of excluding categories such as intravenous drug users, the incarcerated, and homosexuals, who continue to experience extraordinarily high levels of levels of HIV infection. Considered deviant and undeserving, these persons have

deliberately been excluded from harm reduction programs. Overall, this work argues for the untapped potential of anthropological research in the health field, a confident anthropology rooted in ethnography and a critical reflexivity. Crucially, it argues that in context of interdisciplinary collaborations, anthropological research must refuse relegation to the status of an adjunct discipline, and must be free epistemologically and methodologically from the universalizing assumptions and practices of biomedicine.

Applied Drama and

Theatre as an Interdisciplinary Field in the Context of HIV/AIDS in Africa Jan 02 2021  
Drama for Life, University of the Witwatersrand, aims "to enhance the capacity of young people, theatre practitioners and their communities to take responsibility for the quality of their lives in the context of HIV and AIDS in Africa. We achieve this through participatory and experiential drama and theatre that is appropriate to current social realities but draws on the rich indigenous knowledge of African communities."

Three case studies report on mapping as a creative device for playmaking; the methodology of Themba Interactive Theatre; and applying drama with women living with HIV in the Zandspruit Informal Settlement. The essays validate the importance of play in both energizing those in positions of hopelessness and enabling the distancing essential to observe one's situation and enable change. The

book stimulates the ongoing investigation of current practice and extends an invitation to further develop innovative approaches. Chief among these are gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men, and transgender persons, who globally face the disproportional burden of HIV infection. This volume rethinks HIV prevention and health promotion

Mar 16 2022 Of the more than 40 million people around the world currently living with HIV/AIDS, two million live in Latin America and the Caribbean. In an engaging chronicle illuminated by his travels in the region, Shawn Smallman shows

how the varying histories and cultures of the nations of Latin America have influenced the course of the pandemic. He demonstrates that a disease spread in an intimate manner is profoundly shaped by impersonal forces.

In Latin America, Smallman explains, the AIDS pandemic has fractured into a series of subepidemics, driven by different factors in each country. Examining cultural issues and public policies at the country, regional, and global levels, he discusses why HIV has had such a heavy impact on Honduras, for instance, while leaving the

neighboring state of Nicaragua relatively untouched, and why Latin America as a whole has kept infection rates lower than other global regions, such as Africa and Asia. Smallman draws on the most recent scientific research as well as his own interviews with AIDS educators, gay leaders, drug traffickers, crack addicts, transvestites, and doctors in Cuba, Brazil, and Mexico. Highlighting the realities of gender, race, sexuality, poverty, politics, and international relations throughout Latin America and the Caribbean, Smallman brings a fresh perspective to understanding the

cultures of the region as well as the global AIDS crisis.

**HIV and the Blood Supply** Apr 05 2021 During the early years of the AIDS epidemic, thousands of Americans became infected with HIV through the nation's blood supply. Because little reliable information existed at the time AIDS first began showing up in hemophiliacs and in others who had received transfusions, experts disagreed about whether blood and blood products could transmit the disease. During this period of great uncertainty, decisionmaking regarding the blood supply became

increasingly difficult and fraught with risk. This volume provides a balanced inquiry into the blood safety controversy, which involves private sexual practices, personal tragedy for the victims of HIV/AIDS, and public confidence in America's blood services system. The book focuses on critical decisions as information about the danger to the blood supply emerged. The committee draws conclusions about what was done--and recommends what should be done to produce better outcomes in the face of future threats to blood safety. During my tenure as President, in 1996, Brazil adopted a law guaranteeing free and universal access to AIDS treatment for all people living with HIV/AIDS. Brazil became the first

developing country to provide publicly-financed AIDS treatment for all people living with HIV/AIDS. We now have one of the world's most successful AIDS programs that is considered a model for other developing countries. Today, 185,000 people receive life-saving AIDS cocktails in Brazil, and thousands of lives have been saved. But this was not an easy battle. There were many challenges along the way. Brazil's AIDS movement was extraordinarily important in promoting progressive AIDS policies; associations of people living with HIV were the first to denounce pervasive AIDS-related discrimination and called public attention to the importance of AIDS. **Religion and AIDS in Africa** Dec 21 2019 The African AIDS epidemic has sparked fierce debate over the role of religion. Some scholars and activists argue that religion is contributing to the spread of HIV and to the stigmatization of people living with AIDS. Others claim that religion reduces the spread of HIV and promotes care and support for the sick and their survivors. This volume addresses the interface of two major national problems: the epidemic of HIV-AIDS and the widespread use of illegal injection drugs. Should communities have the option of giving drug users sterile needles or bleach for cleaning needs in order to reduce the spread of HIV? Does needle distribution worsen the drug problem, as opponents of such programs argue? Do they reduce the spread of other serious diseases, such as hepatitis? Do they result in more used

needles being carelessly discarded in the community? The panel takes a critical look at the available data on needle exchange and bleach distribution programs, reaches conclusions about their efficacy, and offers concrete recommendations for public policy to reduce the spread of HIV/AIDS. The book includes current knowledge about the epidemiologies of HIV/AIDS and injection drug use; characteristics of needle exchange and bleach distribution programs and views on those programs from diverse community groups; and a discussion of laws designed to

control possession of needles, their impact on needle sharing among injection drug users, and their implications for needle exchange programs. *Financial Aid and Loans for Students* Crash Course Jul 08 2021 Different schools have different policies regarding how they offer financial aids to students. A student seeking financial aid from any particular institution will, therefore, do well to stay abreast of information about that particular institution and its regulations regarding financial aid. Each of these schools has different aims regarding how much of student

financial needs they are willing to meet. While some schools, like Columbia University, intend to meet 100% of the students' needs financially, some other schools go less. Grants are given to students without repayment. The amount of grant varies based on the level of education and also the complexity of the study work or project. In the case of New York University, for example, grants provided only meet 68% of the student's needs; this means the student may experience budget gap. This same school gives most of its aids to its students in the form of loans, which the student is expected

to pay back after graduation. Some conditions also determine how much of the student's needs the school can meet. A student with solid academic performance, for example, can benefit from a higher percentage of financial aid compared to another student not having such performance. Some other schools consider the financial strength of the student or that of his/her parent when offering financial aids. However, a school like Columbia University, mentioned earlier, does not utilize such measure to determine who to give student loan and who not to

give; they give their students aids based on merit alone. It translates to the fact that even Bill Gate's son can get student aid based on merit in this school. There are several other schools in the same category; some of such schools offering their students merit aid are Brown University, Pomona College, Amherst College, Williams College, Princeton University and Massachusetts Institute of Technology. In calculating merit award, the institutions concerned would consider the percentage discount off tuition. Private colleges offer average tuition discount of

33.5%; this means a student can end up paying only \$19,650 if the actual tuition fee is \$30,000. The cut represents 33.5% of the actual fee. In public college, on the other hand, the student is given just 15% cut off the actual price. When seeking for school financial aid, the school can give the student verbal assurance, but this is never enough. The best guide a student can have regarding financial aids is the Common Data Set. Each of the schools in the united states has a Common Data Set; it is an amazing document, more or less a treasure trove of statistics on the characteristics valued by the

school in its application, retention, freshmen class profile and enrollment. The document will equally show the number of students requiring financial aid from the institution concerned, as well as the number of students that are given. Furthermore, the document reveals information about the percentage of student's needs the institution can meet, how the awards are split between loans and grants, as well as what average package is worth. The student can easily search the major search engines for "Common Data Set" specific for any school. The internet

can reveal information about in-house scholarship and college aids for easy access. Such information can equally reveal if a student is qualified for financial aid or not. Some schools, like Baylor University, provide scholarship calculator on their website, which helps the student check eligibility for any particular scholarship program related to the school. Eligibility for any scholarship is usually determined by the class rank of the student, as well as his/her ACT or SAT score.
