Essential reading for scholars, poetry lovers, and anyone with an interest in Rainer Maria Rilke, German poetry, or the creative impulse, these ten letters of correspondence between Rilke and a young aspiring poet reveal elements from the inner workings of his own poetic identity. The letters coincided with an important stage of his artistic development and readers can trace many of the themes that later emerge in his best works to these messages—Rilke himself stated these letters contained part of his creative genius. The correspondence between Bohemian-Austrian poet Rainer Maria Rilke and Franz Xaver Kappus, 19-year old officer cadet at the Theresian Military Academy, occurred between 1902 and 1908. In this collection of ten letters known as "Letters to a Young Poet" Franz Kappus seeks advice on the quality of his poetry from Rilke. Direct criticism of Kappus' poetry, Rilke argues in his response, is not something he can do because as he writes, "Nobody can advise you and help you, nobody. There is only one way. Go into yourself." Over the course of these ten letters Rilke offers more than just advice on being a great poet but for living as he advises Kappus to focus on how he should feel, love, and seek truth in trying to understand and experience the world around him. Written during a key period of Rilke's early artistic development this short work gives us a beautiful insight into the mind of a great poet. This book documents a poet's coming to writing via the influence of Emily Dickinson. The Emily muse guides the young poet through a town called Bay du Vin, where a terrible storm kills many fishermen. The storm introduces death into the world of art, the world created by the poet and her muse as a kind of placeless heaven. Titled, "Much Madness is Divinest

Sense/Letters from the Asylum," the following section makes of its setting a significant symbol: a cage, a prison, an asylum and figures finitude and limitation as a response to the tragedy written from the perspective of the fisherman's wives. The end of the journey, "Circumference," deals with the Dickinsonian idea of limitation and expansion, the I and the not - I, and how one negotiates the distance between the self and other, self and God. These final poems investigate the world of Bay du Vin as seen through the poet's eyes, there is a movement away from Emily and towards the poet's plotting of her own circumference. This dialogue sheds light on the "stuff of poetry" and should be useful to teachers, professors, writers and critiques, or anyone interested in the poetic process. Never before translated into English, Rainer Maria Rilke's fascinating Letters to a Young Painter, written toward the end of his life between 1920 and 1926, is a surprising companion to his infamous Letters to a Young Poet, earlier correspondence from 1902 to 1908. While the latter has become a global phenomenon, with millions of copies sold in many different languages, the present volume has been largely overlooked. In these eight intimate letters written to a teenage Balthus—who would go on to become one of the leading artists of his generation—Rilke describes the challenges he faced, while opening the door for the young painter to take himself and his work seriously. Rilke's constant warmth, his ability to sense in advance his correspondent's difficulties and propose solutions to them, and his sensitivity as a person and an artist come across in these charming and honest letters. Rainer Rilke is considered one of the most significant poets in the German language. The letters in this book were written by Rilke to Franz Kappus, a 19-year-old student at the Military Academy of Vienna. Discouraged by the prospect of military life, Kappus began to send his poetry to the 27-year-old Rilke, seeking both literary criticism and career advice. After Rilke's death, Kappus assembled and published the letters. Although the first letter from Kappus asked for critiques of his poetry, Rilke gave him very little during their correspondence. He also discouraged Kappus from reading criticism, advising him to trust his inner judgment.



Instead, the majority of the letters address personal issues that Kappus revealed to Rilke; their span is tremendous, ranging from atheism, loneliness, sexuality, and career choices. Rilke was a prolific letter writer-- some seven thousand of his letters have survived. This volume makes available two of the earliest collections of Rilke letters published after his death. The thematic collection *Letters on God* contains two letters by Rilke, the first an actual letter written during World War I, the second a fictional letter composed after the war. *Letters to A Young Woman* include 9 letters written to admirer Lisa Heise from 1919 to 1924.
